Two questions:

How do the best lawyers bring all of who they are to act ethically in challenging moments of professional practice?

How can legal education better prepare future lawyers so that they have the capacity for ethical action?

The answer lies in a lawyer's professional identity.

Being an ethical lawyer is a matter of who one is, as much as a matter of what one knows, or what one is able to do.

A lawyer's professional identity is a deep sense of self in role.

"I am the kind of lawyer who....."



"I wish my identity weren't so wrapped up with who I am."

Why Identity?

Reliance on external motivations (rules and incentives) has proven ineffective.

Identity relies on intrinsic motivations.

Virtues

Virtues are character traits that form a healthy identity. They are dispositions and capacities that bring you closer to an ideal.

Six Virtues = Ethical Professional Identity

Competence Fidelity to the law Fidelity to the client Public-spiritedness ► Civility Practical wisdom

Competence

"I am an excellent lawyer, one who has the knowledge, skill, diligence and judgment to assist my clients."

Fidelity to the Client

"I am a lawyer who fulfills my duties of utmost good faith and devotion to my client, and I do not permit my personal interests or the interests of others to interfere with those duties."

Fidelity to the Law

"I am a lawyer who is faithful to and upholds the law and the institutions of the law."

Public-Spiritedness

"I am a lawyer who practices in a spirit of public service. I seek to ensure access to justice and to regulate the legal profession for the benefit of the public. I do my share to ensure access to justice, and I seek to improve the law."

Civility

"I am a lawyer who is civil to everyone with whom I come in contact as a lawyer. I am courteous, cooperative, and honest, and I do not engage in abusive tactics."

Practical Wisdom

"I am a lawyer who cultivates the practical wisdom that I need in order to deploy my other virtues, both personal and professional, in particular situations in the right amounts, in the right way, and for the right reasons."

Example: Spaulding v. Zimmerman













Doctor to defense lawyer:

"The one feature of the case which bothers me more than any other...is the fact that this boy of 20 years of age has an aneurysm, which means a dilatation of the aorta and the arch of the aorta. Of course an aneurysm or dilatation of the aorta in a boy of this age is a serious matter as far as his life. This aneurysm ...might rupture with further dilatation and this would cause his death."
