### **Course Goals:**

In this course, students will learn the rules that govern the admissibility of evidence in American trials. We will examine the concepts of relevance, hearsay, and character evidence; issues relating to opinion evidence and the reliability of expert testimony; rules governing the admissibility of physical evidence and devices designed to ensure an orderly and efficient trial; and constitutional provisions impacting the admission of evidence at trial. We will also study the federal common law of privileges, with special attention to the attorney-client privilege. As we study these rules and concepts, this course will provide you with the opportunity to develop core lawyering competencies of (1) identifying and assessing issues relating to the admissibility of evidence and (2) engaging in effective problem solving relating to those issues.

By way of background, most states have their own evidence rules or codes. California's Evidence Code (to which you will see regular references in the textbook) became effective in 1966, and the Federal Rules of Evidence ("FRE") followed, going into effect in 1975. Most of the states (including North Dakota and Minnesota) have adopted rules based on the federal version, generally with variations particular to each state. Because of the prominence of the FRE, and because bar examiners use these rules as the standard, we will focus primary attention on them in addition to reviewing the common law, which was the basis for the FRE.

#### **Course Policies:**

1. <u>Technology & Recording</u>: This course incorporates digital resources that help you learn Evidence and earn points by demonstrating what you have learned. Please make sure you can access and use these resources before the semester begins.

- 2. <u>Blackboard and Zoom</u>. Classes are scheduled to be held face-to face, in the classroom. Course materials and announcements are posted on <u>Blackboard</u>. In addition, Blackboard will be used to make course PowerPoint slides available. Remote classes are possible and, if scheduled, will be held via <u>Zoom</u>. Prepare for the semester by making sure you can reliably access and use both Blackboard and Zoom.
- 3. <u>CALI Online Learning Modules</u>. Unless you already have an account with <u>CALI</u>, you will need to register with CALI to obtain access. Students will complete two online learning modules through CALI. The primary purpose of these is to provide additional reinforcement of course concepts. Satisfactory completion of the modules is mandatory and scores/completion rates are recorded. Students are required to complete these learning modules individually, without consulting other students. Students will receive 5 points toward their final grade for satisfactory completion of each module.

Students must access each CALI module by using the LessonLink URL provided on Blackboard. After clicking the CALI link on Blackboard, sign into CALI using your official UND student email address. Otherwise, completion will not be recorded. Also, students must register with CALI and be logged into the site before beginning the activities.

Student responses are saved automatically as you advance through the CALI Lesson, provided you remain connected to the internet. If your computer goes to sleep or is shut down, you may lose some of your answers. If you are stepping away from the computer before completing the Lesson, you should exit the Lesson and use the "Resume" tab to pick up where you left off.

Also, the Lessons are designed to keep you moving forward. The browser back button may be used, but the results are unpredictable. When you have completed a Lesson, save a copy of your completion certificate.

**4.** Online Textbook Study Center You must purchase a new casebook, but it can be either in hard copy (printed) form or an e-book. Regardless of which format you purchase, you will be provided with codes to access an online "Casebook Connect" website with study features. Most class sessions will include learning activities that students access through the Casebook Connect feature of your textbook (a link is available on Blackboard under the tab "Casebook Connect"). These learning activities are noted in red on the Schedule of In-Class Learning Activities. You will find them on the Casebook Connect website under the tab "Study." These activities are intended to serve as formative assessment (i.e., activities that measure and enhance learning but do not get scored for a grade) and can be completed either individually or in small groups.

<u>Purchasing a Casebook that Provides Necessary Access</u>: Students must obtain a new casebook with the access code for the online Study Center, which we will use during this course. You will also have access to interactive study questions and other learning tools on the Casebook Connect website <a href="https://www.casebookconnect.com/">https://www.casebookconnect.com/</a> Please make sure you have a new Sklansky 5<sup>th</sup> edition (2020) casebook with the code you will need for the digital learning activities we use in this class. The difference between option (a) and option (b) is merely whether you want a hard copy, printed book. Either way, the access codes can only be used by one person, which is why **you should not purchase a book elsewhere and you should not purchase a used book**. If you purchase a book from another online vendor, it may have missing or defective codes. You need to get the course materials either from the UND bookstore or through the above publisher link. 5. Attendance: You are expected to attend every class, and attendance records will be kept. I understand that students may occasionally need to miss class for a variety of reasons. Please be aware that in accordance with American Bar Association standards, the School of Law requires "regular class attendance" by students in order to be eligible to receive academic credit for a course. Excessive absences may result in your being administratively withdrawn from the course by the School of Law and not permitted to sit for the final examination. See UND School of Law Policy Manual I.B.1 ("At the request of the faculty member, excess absences from class may result in the student being administratively withdrawn from the course by the Dean."). Your attendance may also impact my assessment of your class participation. See infra Grading.

You are permitted to miss no more than five (5) classes. This number is to include all absences for any reason, including sickness, out-of-town interviews, etc. (i.e., the policy does not contain or make distinctions based on categories such as "unexcused" or "excused"). If you miss more than five (5) classes for any reason, you must provide me with a complete, timely, and satisfactory written explanation, including the reason(s) you were absent for each of the missed classes, your plans to ensure the materials covered in the missed classes will be learned, and the reasons you should be permitted to continue in the course rather than being administratively withdrawn pursuant to this attendance policy. Please contact me with questions or concerns about the attendance policy.

I start class promptly. I expect you to be seated and ready to learn at that time. I therefore expect you to avoid late arrivals for class whenever possible. If you are unavoidably late, I prefer that you attend class rather than miss the session; but I also expect you to explain your lateness to me either before class or as soon as possible thereafter.

**6.** <u>Class Preparation & Participation</u>: Class participation is expected, and your preparation is assumed. I hope that each of you will make a serious effort to learn the material by doing rigorous preparation before each class and to contribute to the learning of the other students by sharing your analysis and ideas during class.

While I expect every student to prepare every day, students will be assigned to an "expert panel," which will be responsible for spearheading class discussion on a particular date. During class, the expert panel assigned for that day will be called upon to present each case, summarize the Rule(s) covered, and construct takeaways from the assigned reading. The panel will answer questions posed by me and by other students. I will direct my questions largely (but not exclusively) toward students in the assigned group. You earn up to 5 points for group participation by attending on your group's expert days, assisting your group in answering

questions from me and your classmates about the assigned material, and substantively facilitating class discussion.

Expert panel assignments will be posted on Blackboard, and some students will be assigned to an expert panel for Class 2. Please check the posted document and be well prepared. If you know that you will not be able to attend class on the date your assigned expert panel will be presenting, you may arrange to switch groups with another student. Email me no later than the date of Class 2 to let me know who has agreed to switch groups with you.

For every class, please set aside enough time beforehand to read and adequately study the assigned materials. Although the time required will vary depending on the number of pages assigned and the complexity of the topics involved, you should expect to devote an average of approximately two hours and 10 minutes of outside preparation for each one (1) credit hour of time spent in class (i.e., eight hours and 40 minutes per week). *See infra* Schedule of Assignments (accreditation standards for course-related work outside of class hours).

The Schedule of Assignments identifies the pages from the Casebook (Sklansky) and/or FRE provisions (found in an appendix to the Capra Supplement) you are responsible to read to prepare for class. I recommend that you read the text of any assigned FRE provision first. After reading the assigned FRE, you should devote most of your remaining pre-class study time to reading and understanding the explanatory material in the assigned portions of the Casebook. I also highly encourage you to read the relevant portions of the Capra Supplement either in enhancing your knowledge and understanding before class, and/or in reviewing and outlining the material after class or later in the semester.

The study of Evidence is challenging. At certain points, you will likely become frustrated with the material and might be tempted to take short cuts, including by failing to complete the reading assignments in a thorough and focused manner. This would be a very big mistake. There are no effective short cuts to studying and learning in Evidence. The only way effectively to learn the material is to work with it throughout the course. Outline subjects after we have finished them, and review past materials frequently. My role – both in and outside of class – is to help you learn the law; but there is no substitute for your own independent hard work on the subject, interacting with the assigned materials, and building your understanding a piece at a time.

7. <u>Grading</u> : Grades for this course will be based on quality in-class participation on assigned expert panels, timely completion of 2 CALI learning modules, timely completion of 4 quizzes, and a final examination. Opportunities to earn bonus points may also be made availabl This course is graded on a 100-point scale, distributed as follows:

Four Quizzes: There will be four timed, open-book quizzes to test your understanding of important segments of this course. The quizzes must be taken on Blackboard, individually, without consulting other students. These quizzes will focus on significant takeaways from the class, based on assigned reading and the exploration of the assignments during class. Students have the opportunity to earn 40 points toward their final grade by taking these quizzes.

**Final Exam:** There will be a written final examination at the end of the semester, consisting of multiple-choice questions based upon the course materials. The examination will be closed book. This final examination is subject to the School of Law's Examination Rescheduling Policy and to the requirements of the Honor Code and this course's Academic Integrity Policy (see infra).

In addition to the examination, your final grade may also be affected by the quality of your class participation during the course of the semester. In determining the quality of class participation and professionalism, I will take into account your on-time attendance (please send me an e-mail if you are unable to attend a class or must arrive late or leave early), professionalism (e.g., use of professional language, respect and support for your colleagues in the class, attentiveness to the discussions, appropriate laptop usage, no use of unauthorized technology), the content of questions and comments (there is no penalty for an incorrect response if you make a good faith effort), and your participation in class discussion. Additional standards for assessing your professionalism are (1) adherence to the UND School of Law's Oath of Professionalism and Honor Code, and (2) adherence to the North Dakota Aspirations of Professionalism and Civility (https://cdn.ymaws.com/www.sband.org/resource/resmgr/docs/about\_sband/NDAPC.pdf) and Rules of Professional Conduct (https://www.ndcourts.gov/legal-resources/rules/ndrprofconduct).

## **Schedule of Assignments:**

Abbreviations: Sklansky ("Casebook"); Federal Rules of Evidence ("FRE") (available in an appendix to the Capra Supplement).

Beneath each date is a brief description of the topic(s) to be covered in each class, tracking the language used in the chapter and section headings of the textbook. In the right column you will find the assigned FRE provisions and readings from the Casebook. Please be aware that supplemental materials may be added throughout the course and dates for specific assignments may be modified as class discussion dictates or as needed because of unexpected events. If I make changes to the Schedule of Assignments, I will announce them ahead of time in class and/or post them on Blackboard as announcements.

Again, according to U.S. Department of Education and ABA accreditation standards, and UND School of Law policy adopted in compliance with those standards, students are expected to spend at least two (2) hours and 10 minutes on course-related work outside of class for each one (1) credit hour of in-class time. For this four-credit course, that means you should be spending an average of at least eight (8) hours and 40 minutes per week outside of the classroom on course-related work.
